Tips on choosing subjects:

- Choose subjects that interest you
- Choose subjects you are good at
- How do you learn best? Would an academic or practical course suit you?
- Consider which subjects, if any, are relevant for the types of careers that interest you
- If you are trying to decide between two subjects remember there are some subjects that can be taken without prior knowledge in Year 12

Don't choose a subject because:

- Your friends are choosing it
- You want to be strategic with a subject that scales up
- Your parents tell you to
- You have heard it's easy

No idea what you want to do after secondary school?

Don't worry! A mix of subjects you like and are good at will keep a range of career routes open.

Know what you want to do in the future?

Check if there are subject requirements for a specific course or career you are interested in. These may vary for very similar courses at different universities.
